2006 Annual Awards

We will be giving out the Annual Awards at our meeting in January, 2007. If your dog has earned an AKC title in the field, obedience or conformation ring during the period of November 2005 through November 2006 and you are an R.C.L.R.C. member of good standing, you are eligible for this award.

If you have bred the dog, you will receive a "Breeder Award". The owner of the dog shall receive an individual award.

Your dog must have finished an American or Canadian Championship, obedience title, hunting title or working certificate to qualify. Dockdog and UKC titles are also included this year!.

Dogs that have finished their championship and earned a title in two different performance disciplines are eligible for the "All Around" Labrador award.

Dogs are also eligible for the "Versatility" Award or "Certificate of Achievement" Award.

"Versatility" Award a dog must earn a working title in two different areas from the following:

- A) Obedience OTCH, UDX, UD, CDX, or CD
- B) Hunting FC, AFC, MH, SH or JH
- C) Tracking VST, TDX or TD
- D) Agility MAX, MAD, OAD OR NAD
- · E) Rally RN, RA, RE
- F) Dock Dogs NJ, JJ, SJ, MJ, EJ

And in addition one certificate from the following: CGC, TDI, Delta Society, WC, WCX or TT.

This is a reminder, to be sure to add your Optigen tested dogs to this FREE Optigen Labrador Database!

This website is a great research tool, because it also allows you to include a link to your website. I hope everyone checks this site for Optigen ratings and pedigrees, before you breed, to not produce PRA affected puppies. The "submission/registration form, to enter your dogs, is located at the top of the page, in the GOLD BOX. Your dog is not automatically included on this website, by being Optigen tested. You must fill out and email the submission form, on the website. It is FREE to both list your dogs and FREE to access/research the database.

This site is maintained by Candee Bossard of Tanbrae Labradors. Candee maintains this website, for the love of the breed, but donations to keep the site running, may be donated through the website. The OFA has also recently resumed registering Optigen results, but the OFA does charge a fee to do so.

I just lost my PRA blind bitch, Charlotte and her last few years were very painful and difficult. Her PRA developed into Glaucoma, causing her eyes to swell. Progressive Retinal Atrophy is an avoidable condition now and we need to do all we can to banish it from the breed!

\*\* OFA REGISTRATIONS RESUME \*\*

The OFA has resumed registration of OptiGen prcd-PRA results for all eligible breeds, according to an August 23rd letter to OptiGen from Eddie Dziuk, OFA's Chief Operating Officer. OptiGen has added back the OFA registration "sign off" statement at the bottom of all of its test reports. Testers will be able to submit their dog's result to the OFA registry if they wish to do so by mailing a signed copy of the OptiGen report and the required fee directly to the OFA (NOT to Optigen).

OptiGen recently supplied OFA with copies of two peer-reviewed publications that describe the scientific studies on the prcd gene and mutation. Both are published in the research journal "Genomics."

A summary of this research and its impact on canine genetic testing is being prepared by OptiGen and will be posted on this site soon. The research has been extensive, now covering PRA in 18 different purebreds/breed varieties.

The first report, published July 18, 2006, is titled "Linkage disequilibrium mapping in domestic dog breeds narrows the progressive rod-cone degeneration interval and identifies ancestral disease-transmitting chromosome" and is authored by O. Goldstein, B. Zangerl, S. Pearce-Kelling, D.J. Sidjanin, J.W. Kijas, J. Felix, G.M. Acland and G.D. Aguirre.

The second report, published August 26, 2006, is titled "Identical mutation in a novel retinal gene causes progressive rod-cone degeneration in dogs and retinitis pigmentosa in humans" and is authored by

B. Zangerl, O. Goldstein, A. Philp, S. Lindauer, S. Pearce-Kelling, R. Mullins, A. Graphodatsky, D. Ripoll, J. Felix, E. Stone, G. Acland and G. Aguirre.

\*\* CASES OF XYLITOL POISONING IN DOGS RISE \*\*

The Animal Poison Control Center of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has managed a substantially increased number of cases involving xylitol poisoning in dogs. Found in sugar-free chewing gum, candy, and baked goods, xylitol is a sweetener that can cause serious and sometimes life-threatening problems for pets.

The center managed more than 170 cases of xylitol poisoning in 2005, up from approximately 70 in 2004, said Dana Farbman, a certified veterinary technician and spokesperson for the center. As of August, the center had managed nearly 114 cases in 2006.

An increase in availability of xylitol-containing products may be one reason for the rise in cases, Farbman said.

While it was previously thought that only large concentrations of xylitol could cause problems in dogs, lesser amounts of the sweetener may also be harmful, the center reported.

"Our concern used to be mainly with products that contain xylitol as one of the first ingredients," said Dr. Eric Dunayer, who specializes in toxicology at the center. "However, we have begun to see problems developing from ingestions of products with lesser amounts of this sweetener." Dr. Dunayer said that with smaller concentrations of xylitol, the onset of clinical signs could be delayed as much as 12 hours after ingestion.

According to Dr. Dunayer, dogs ingesting substantial amounts of items sweetened with xylitol could develop a sudden drop in blood sugar, resulting in depression, loss of coordination, and seizures. "These signs can develop quite rapidly, at times less than 30 minutes after ingestion of the product. Therefore, it is crucial that pet owners seek veterinary treatment immediately," Dr. Dunayer said. He also said that there appears to be a strong link between xylitol ingestions and the development of liver failure in dogs.

\*\* CASES OF DOGS INGESTING GLUE INCREASE \*\*

An increasing number of dogs are ingesting polyurethane glue, according to the Animal Poison Control Center of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

So far this year, the APCC has managed approximately 140 cases involving exposure of animals to expanding adhesives containing diphenylmethane diisocyanate. Almost all of the cases involved dogs. Last year, the center managed about 135 cases total—up from 33 expanding adhesives cases in 2002.

"Any number of factors could be contributing to the increase, including the growing popularity of do-it-yourself projects or the increased use of this type of adhesive," said Dr. Steven R. Hansen, senior vice president and board-certified veterinary toxicologist at the center.

"Whatever the reason, due to the rising number of cases, the importance of alerting companion animal owners to the dangers of expanding polyurethane glue products is clear."

As diphenylmethane diisocyanate may not always be listed on the product label, pet owners should consider any expanding adhesive product a potential hazard, and should keep the products out of the reach of their pets.

"A dog consuming even small amounts of adhesive containing diphenylmethane diisocyanate can experience serious problems as the product expands in the warm, moist environment of the stomach, forming a porous mass of glue," Dr. Hansen said. "This mass can block the gastrointestinal tract and cause a life-threatening surgical emergency."

'I Don't Want Another Family To Go Through This With Their Dog' August 31, 2006

OAK HARBOR – A popular glue does more that just stick -- it grows when it comes in contact with liquid.


So imagine what would happen if it was swallowed. An Oak Harbor pet owner found out first hand, and her dog is lucky to be alive.

On Thursday, Julie Kosmas got to pet her dog Emma Jo for the first time in three days. The black lab is still recovering in an Oak Harbor animal hospital. She had to undergo surgery after a near-death encounter with a popular glue called "Gorilla Glue."

"When we saw the X-ray it was mind blowing that a dog's stomach could be that big," said Kosmas.

Emma Jo has a knack for knocking things off a counter. That's how she got the Gorilla Glue and swallowed some.

Kosmas knew her dog was in danger. The bottle says to keep away from children and animals. The instructions say get immediate medical attention if swallowed. What it doesn't say is what would happen.



"This is the abdomen," said Veterinarian, Doris Campbell pointing to an X-ray. "This entire roundish blob is her stomach filled with Gorilla Glue."

A couple tablespoons of Gorilla Glue grew to the size of basketball.

"This stuff, when it hit the stomach, expands, blocks the stomach, and will require surgery to fix the animal," said Dr. Campbell.

The veterinarian took out three pounds of hard brown foam from Emma Jo's stomach.

"Keep this out of reach of your children. If this happened to a child?" wondered Kosmas."And, I don't want another family to go through this with their dog."

The company does list an emergency phone number on the bottle in case a person or animal swallows the glue. That's how Dr. Campbell discovered what happens when Gorilla Glue is ingested.

Still, Emma Jo lost 12 pounds, spent nearly a week in the animal hospital and by the time it's all over, the vet bill will be in the thousands. It gives new meaning to claim on every bottle of Gorilla Glue... "The toughest glue on the planet Earth."
